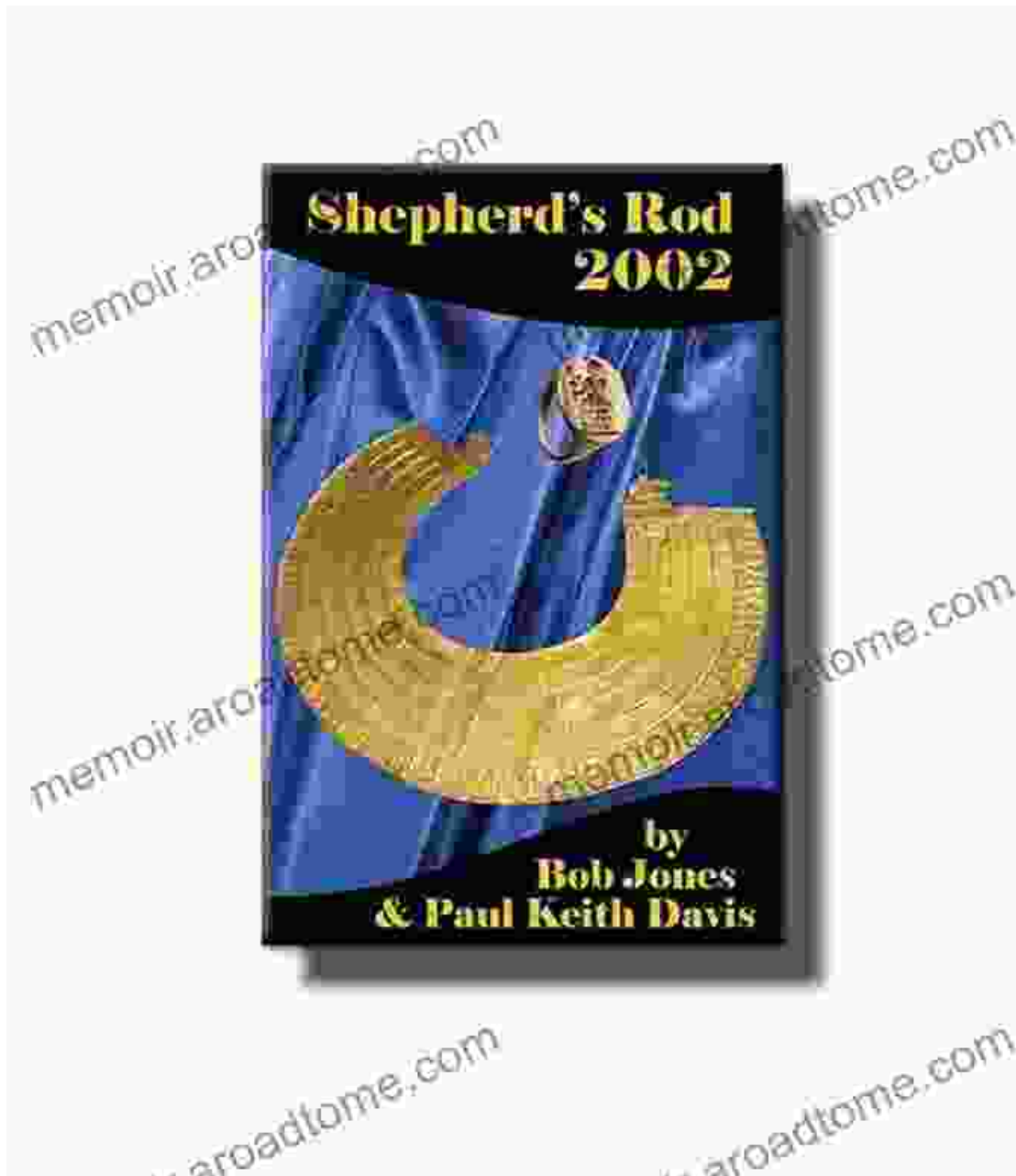

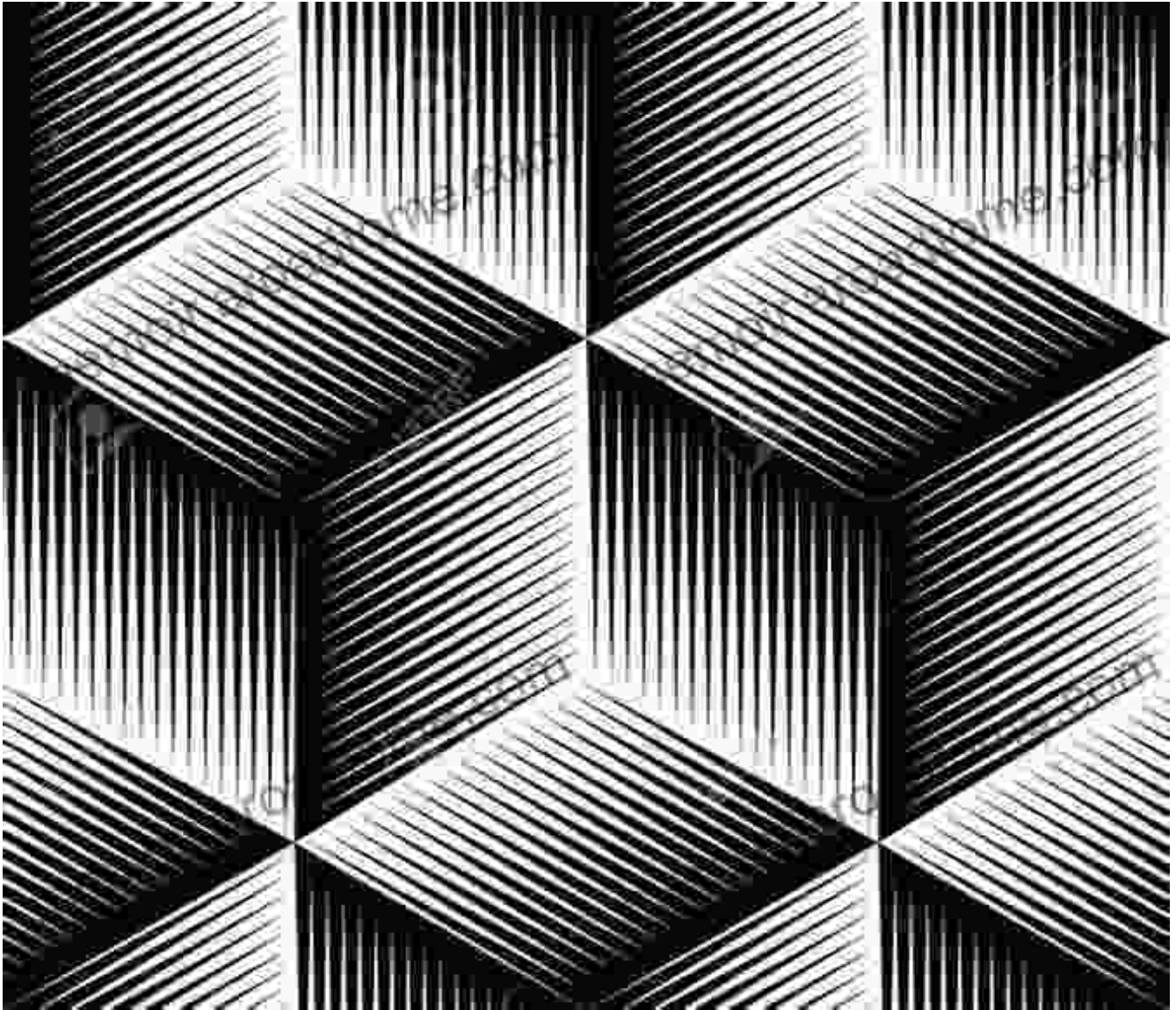

Detail of the shepherd figure





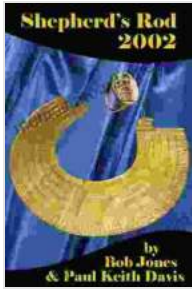
Detail of the geometric patterns
